Scottish Saturday at the Movies also will be on **February 10 & March 3rd in Upper Anderson** (upstairs at Anderson Auditorium). All venues have large-screen movie projection systems. We try to show movies that are less than 2 hours long and have some relationship to Scotland — actor/actress, filmed at least in part in Scotland, highlights a Scottish person, etc. — a fairly broad definition.

Last year, we showed *Brigadoon* (1954, the Scottish musical), *Chariots of Fire* (1981 Oscar for Best Picture) and *Bonnie Scotland* (1935, Laurel & Hardy comedy)

For the three movies, we want you to vote among the following choices (not in any particular order) —

The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie (1969)

Maggie Smith won an Academy Award for her delicately textured portrayal of an eccentric teacher at an exclusive Scottish girls school. Miss Jean exhorts her “gels” to follow their hearts and never lose their youthful idealism. Rated: PG-13. Color.



Rob Roy (1995)



A stirring historical drama in which Liam Neeson's kilted warrior of Scottish lore finds himself locked in enmity with John Hurt's Montrose. Best is Tim Roth's foppish yet dastardly Cunningham and Jessica Lange's sensuous Mary in a film unjustly overshadowed by Mel Gibson's *Braveheart*. Rated R for violence and sexuality. Color.

Thirty-Nine Steps — Alfred Hitchcock (1935 Mystery)

One of Hitchcock's best British films, featuring the definitive Richard Hannay by Robert Donat, struggling to prove his innocence against the gathering forces of darkness. One of the fast and furious chases includes the famous Forth Bridge sequence. Not Rated: G equivalent. B/W.



Mary of Scotland (1936)



Directed by John Ford, this costume drama begins in 1561 when Mary Stuart returned to Scotland from France as the Queen of the Scots. Mary of Scotland (Katherine Hepburn) is a story of political

brinkmanship during the Elizabethan period. Mary tries to strengthen her position by marrying the weak Lord Darnley, who betrays her in an effort to rule the kingdom and is killed. Imprisoned by Scottish lords, Mary is smuggled out of prison, fleeing to England for sanctuary, but finds execution. Mary of Scotland is based on Maxwell Anderson's Broadway play. Not Rated: G equivalent. B/W.

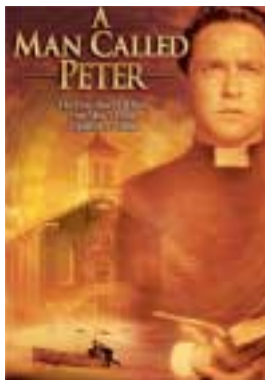
☐ **The Little Minister (1933)**

Based on J. M. Barrie's book, the film is set in rural 1840's Scotland. Gavin Dishart arrives to become the new "little minister" of Thrums's Auld Licht church. He meets a mysterious young gypsy girl (Katherine Hepburn), who helps local weavers rebel and is more than she seems. Not Rated: G equivalent. B/W



☐ **A Man Called Peter (1955)**

True story of a young Scottish lad, Peter Marshall, who dreams of going to sea but finds a different future when called by God to be a minister. Leaving for America, he eventually becomes a pastor to Presidents and then becomes Chaplain of the U.S. Senate. Not Rated: G equivalent. Color.



☐ **My Life So Far (1999)**

Memoir of the lives of a family growing up on a post World War I estate in Argyll, Scotland. Through the household comes a number of suitors hoping to impress a young woman. When the elder woman's son shows up at the estate with his French maid, everything becomes a turmoil. Rated: PG-13. Color



☐ **Whisky Galore (1949)**

Nominated as BAFTA Best British Picture, this fine vintage Ealing comedy shows canny Hebridean islanders secretly removing a wrecked WWII wartime cargo of whisky. *Whisky Galore* was filmed on the island of Barra in the Outer Hebrides. Not Rated: PG equivalent. B/W.



☐ **Hills of Home (1948)**

Lassie, Donald Crisp, Edmund Gwenn
Also known as "Master of Lassie," Donald Crisp is the village doctor in a remote Scottish glen. Tricked into buying

☐ **Four Weddings and a Funeral (1994)**

The film follows Charles (Hugh Grant) and his friends as they wonder if they will ever find true love and marry. Charles thinks he's found "Miss Right" in Carrie (Andie McDowell), an American. This subtle British comedy revolves around Charlie, his friends and the four weddings (including one in Scotland) and one funeral which they attend. Rated: R. Color.



☐ **Wee Geordie (1955)**

Concerned about his small stature, a young Scottish boy applies for a mail-order body building course. At the age of 21, he displays a talent for hammer-throwing, and is selected to represent Britain in the 1956 Olympic Games in Melbourne, Australia. Rated: PG equivalent. Color.

☐ **Bobby Jones: Stroke of Genius (2004)**

Based on the story of Bobby Jones who was the only person ever to win all four of the major golf tournaments in the same year. It has scenes filmed at St. Andrews and Kinneil. Rated: PG. Color



☐ **Greyfriars Bobby: The True Story of a Dog (1961)**

Released by Disney in 1961, *Greyfriars Bobby* follows the adventures of a wee Skye terrier who refuses to be separated from his master, even in death. Bobby sleeps on the old man's grave in the cemetery of Greyfriars church. *Greyfriars Bobby* offers handsome vistas of Edinburgh. Rated: G equivalent. Color.
