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Society Celebrates 25th Anniversary: 2006 Scottish Gala & Robbie Burns Tea

The Montreat Scottish Society will kick off its 25th Anniversary celebration at the Scottish Gala scheduled for Saturday, April 8, 2006, at Assembly Inn in Montreat.

The Inn will be turned into a Scottish castle for the evening black-tie or formal Scottish attire event.

A registration form for the Scottish Gala is included in this newsletter. A separate invitation will be mailed after the holidays to members who are current in their dues. The cost for the Gala is \$70 per person for members; \$90 per person for non-members.

Because of limited seating, the sooner you send your reservation in with your check will help insure that you will be a part of this event. Also, please send in the names of the attendees so that we can properly prepare nametags and seating cards.

The formal black-tie or Scottish attire affair has sold out quickly for the three previous functions.

January 14, 2006 **Brigadoon (1954 Musical)**

One of America's most beloved musicals, *Brigadoon* (1954), the Lerner and Loewe musical by director Vincente Minnelli shows anything is possible: a village can reappear for only one day each century, and Gene Kelly can tap-dance on a dirt path. Kelly and Van Johnson play a pair of New Yorkers who go on a hunting vacation in the highlands of Scotland.

For the two movies on February 11 & March 11, we want you to vote among the following choices —

Chariots of Fire (1981 Sports Drama)

The come-from-behind winner of the 1981 Oscar for best picture, *Chariots of Fire* is a tale of true determination and inspiration. The heroes are an unlikely pair who ran for Great Britain in the 1924 Paris Olympics: devout Protestant (Scottish) Eric Liddell, and Jewish Harold Abrahams, who has to surmount the institutional hurdles of prejudice.

The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie (1969 Drama)

Maggie Smith won an Academy Award for her delicately textured portrayal of an eccentric teacher at an exclusive Scottish girl's school. Miss Jean exhorts her "gels" to follow their hearts and never lose their youthful idealism.

Rob Roy (1995 Drama)

A stirring historical drama in which Liam Neeson's kilted warrior finds himself locked in enmity with John Hurt's Montrose. Best is Tim Roth's foppish yet dastardly Cunningham and Jessica Lange's sensuous Mary in a film unjustly overshadowed by *Braveheart*.

Bonnie Scotland — Laurel & Hardy (1935 Comedy)

Stan and Ollie stowaway to Scotland expecting to inherit the MacLaurel estate. They accidentally join a Scottish regiment bound for India in this comedy classic that was the duo's top-grossing film.

Thirty-Nine Steps — Alfred Hitchcock dir. (1935 Mystery)

One of Hitchcock's best British films, featuring the definitive Richard Hannay in Robert Donat, struggling to prove his innocence against the gathering forces of darkness. One of the fast and furious chases includes the famous Forth Bridge sequence.

Born Fighting: How The Scots-Irish Shaped America & The Illustrated History of Scotland

The Illustrated History of Scotland

A beautiful “coffee table” book with excellent factual content, *The Illustrated History of Scotland* is the rarest of all history books — it is not just fact-filled, but also interesting, readable, and enjoyable with outstanding pictures and maps. It is available from many book stores, online services and many libraries (including the Asheville-Buncombe Public Library).

The Illustrated History of Scotland can be enjoyed on many levels. The book has many highlighted one- and two-page articles that cover interesting elements of Scottish history and culture.

The writing style is clean and crisp, rather than dry and scholarly. It does a lot more than just recite historical facts. It adds some interesting personal observation and commentary, and puts the historical facts into context, commenting on their implications to ordinary Scottish people, and making the historical events seem much more meaningful and relevant.

Author Chris Tabraham has impeccable credentials to write such a book. He has a degree in ancient and medieval history and archeology, and is the Principal Inspector of Ancient Monuments for Scotland. Photographer Colin Baxter is widely published and his work makes a notable contribution to the look and feel of this book.

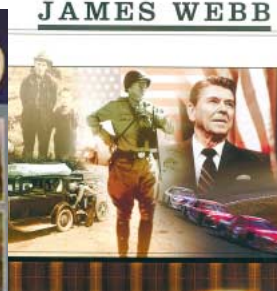
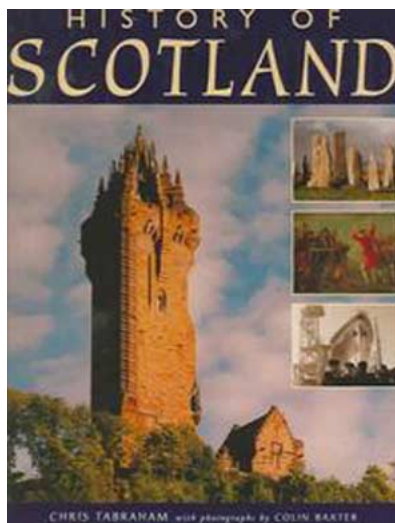
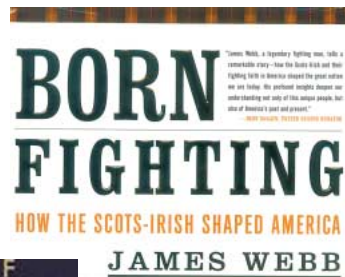

“In telling the story of the Scots-Irish in America as a robust and passionate tale, novelist Webb writes straightforward, no-nonsense, readable history that clips right along while it is also very personal and highly idiosyncratic about a people who, he claims, are largely invisible — taken for granted — to the general public and who, seldom thinking of themselves in ethnic identity terms, mostly don’t know their culture. Webb maintains that Scots-Irish attitudes form the bedrock of American society, especially among the working class. Scots-Irish culture has produced American presidents from Andrew Jackson

to Bill Clinton, soldiers from Ulysses S. Grant to George Patton, pioneers, preachers, and others whose most common characteristics may be described as fierce individualism, persistent egalitarianism, and a strong sense of personal honor. Perhaps the most visible examples of broad and ongoing Scots-Irish legacy are the fundamentalist Christianity (a potent combination of Scottish Calvinism and headstrong populism) of America's Bible Belt and country music. Webb begins the Scots-Irish saga in Scotland, where, he says, the Scots-Irish character was formed, moves on to the Ulster Scots of what is now Northern Ireland, and follows them to the Appalachians and points beyond as well as through the American Revolution, the Civil War, and up to the present day. Popular history at its finest.”
